

Hebrew Pronunciation Guide

- Most consonants and vowels are pronounced as in Italian or Spanish.
- Syllables with only an apostrophe as the vowel, such as *b'* or *l'*, have a range of pronunciations in practice. Acceptable options include a neutral schwa (ə), ih (I), and eh (ε).
- eh is pronounced like the word “bed”
- ei is pronounced like the word “way”
- ai is pronounced like the word “I”
- tz is pronounced like the consonant in “pizza”
- ch is the guttural sound used in the German “Bach” or Scottish “loch” (x in IPA)
- h is pronounced like an English h, and it is silent at the end of a word
