Official Transcript: Jesus Temptation - 1

Temptations: Do They Kill?

Temptation, and often the result sin, will put your life and your soul into jeopardy. But what are the KEYS to conquering temptation? If you find and use these keys, your life will be happier and CAN be eternal.

Intro

Before Jesus came to earth, he did not know how it felt to be tempted. He was just like his Father and could not be tempted. But when he became like us, THEN he experienced being tempted. He needed the same keys you do.

To find the keys, you need to understand temptation.

"Where do temptations come from?" Answer. "Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. (14) But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. (15) Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death." (James 1:13-15). The desires to do wrong are inside of every human, including you.

Temptations themselves are not wrong. James told us that we are "lured" and "enticed".

Satan treats you and me like fish. He puts shiny things in front of us to get us to bite his bait, and sin.

Satan uses the 3 different forms of bait to tempt us to sin. "1 John 2:16 For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes

and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world." Jesus experienced all three kinds when Satan tempted him. You have an opportunity to learn about each temptation in the next 3 videos.

Here comes the key

God has PROMISED his faithful help with temptation, but only for those who are DEDICATED to him. Think about it. Why should He help someone who IGNORES him, or CHOOSES to be disobedient? But to the loyal, obedient follower, He is faithful. Paul wrote, "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation HE WILL ALSO PROVIDE THE WAY OF ESCAPE, that you may be ABLE TO ENDURE it."

The Keys are, #1, God will help the committed Christian to either SEE a way out, or #2, be able to ENDURE the desire.

A 3rd key to overcoming temptation is to follow Jesus' example. We will examine those examples in the next 3 videos (links are in the description or Additional Resources). You will find out how he overcame each of 3 different kinds of temptation. YOU CAN OVERCOME TEMPTATION. HE DID!

4 lessons

- Follow Luke's order of flesh, eyes, pride

- Temptations themselves
 - 1 John 2:16 1 John 2:16 For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world.
- Jesus & stones
- Jesus & kingdoms

- Jesus & temple
- Complete all 4 at one recording session
 - Do separate Hooks
 - Do separate endings
 - Edit and prepare all 4 before releasing the 1st one.

Notes on Temptation itself

- Do not forget to use 1 John 2:16 & 1 Cor 10.13
- Use James 1.13-15
 - James 1:13-15 Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. (14) But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. (15) Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.
- James 1.13-15
 - RWP James 1.13-15
 - Prohibiting such a habit
 - The use of apo shows origin (apo with ablative case), not agency
 - I have heard wicked and weak men blame God for their sins. Cf. <u>Pro_19:3</u>; Sirach 15:11f. Temptation does not spring "from God." Proverbs 19:3 When a man's folly brings his way to ruin, his heart rages against the LORD.
 - Epithumia is old word for craving
 - Enticed (deleazomenos). Present passive participle of deleazo, old verb from delear (bait), to catch fish by bait or to hunt with snares
 - The lust (hē epithumia). Note article, the lust (Jas_1:14) which one has.
 - Not a shotgun blast pattern, but a rifle shot. 1 bullet.
 - Here also of lust (as a woman), "having conceived." The will yields to lust and conception takes place.
 - Beareth sin (tiktei hamartian). Present active indicative of tiktō to bring forth as a mother or fruit from seed, old verb, often in N.T., here only in James. Sin is the union of the will with lust. See <u>Psa_7:14</u> for this same metaphor.

(Psalms 7:14 Behold, the wicked man conceives evil and is pregnant with mischief and gives birth to lies.)

- The sin (he hamartia). The article refers to hamartia just mentioned.
- It does not mean "full-grown" like teleioō, but rather completeness of parts or functions as opposed to rudimentary state (Hort) like the winged insect in contrast with the chrysalis or grub.
- The sin at birth is fully equipped for its career (Rom_6:6). (Romans 6:6 We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin.)
- o Vincent
 - Of God (ἀπὸ Θεοῦ) Lit., from God. Not by God, as the direct agent, but by agency proceeding from God.
 - Lit., is incapable of being tempted.
 - "He himself tempteth no man."
 - Only here in New Testament. This and the following word are metaphors from hunting and fishing. *Drawn away,* as beasts are enticed from a safecovert into a place beset with snares. Note the present participle, as indicating the *progress* of the temptation: "is *being drawn* away."
- It should be remembered that since Jesus has been divine, he has not had the experience of humans dealing with temptations.
- ∘ J-F-B
 - enticed literally, "taken with a bait," as fish are. The further progress: the man allowing himself (as the Greek middle voice implies) to be enticed to evil.
 - Then *the particular sin* (so the *Greek* implies), "when it is completed, brings forth death,"
 - He who will fight Satan with Satan's own weapons, must not wonder if he finds himself overmatched.
- o Barnes
 - Temptation is a subject which does not pertain to him.
- 1 John 2:16
 - o RWP
 - "The lust of the flesh" (*hē epithumia tēs sarkos*, subjective genitive, lust felt by the flesh) may be illustrated by <u>Mar_4:19; Gal_5:17</u>.

- ē epithumia tōn ophthalmōn (the lust of the eyes) is subjective, lust with the eyes as organs as shown by Jesus in <u>Mat_5:28</u>.
 - Matthew 5:28 But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lustful intent has already committed adultery with her in his heart.
- o Vincent
 - The lust of the flesh involves the appropriation of the desired object. 1 Peter 2:11 Beloved, I urge you as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions of the flesh, which wage war against your soul.
- o TSK
 - Romans 13:14 But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make <u>no provision for the flesh</u>, to gratify its desires.
 - Gal 5.24 Galatians 5:24 And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh <u>with its passions and</u> <u>desires.</u>
 - Eph 2:3 among whom we all once lived <u>in the passions of our flesh</u>, carrying out the <u>desires of the body</u> and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind.
 - Titus 2.12 training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age,
 - Gen 3.6 So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate.
 - Gen 6.2 the sons of God <u>saw that the daughters of man</u> were attractive. And they took as their wives any they chose.
 - Joshua 7.21 <u>when I saw</u> among the spoil a beautiful cloak from Shinar, and 200 shekels of silver, and a bar of gold weighing 50 shekels, <u>then I coveted them</u> and took them. And see, they are hidden in the earth inside my tent, with the silver underneath."
 - Psa 119.37 <u>Turn my eyes from looking at worthless</u> <u>things</u>; and give me life in your ways.

- Dan 4.30 and the king answered and said, "Is not this great Babylon, <u>which I have built</u> by <u>my</u> mighty power as a royal residence and for the <u>glory of my majesty</u>?"
- Homiletical
 - "The habit of a mind engrossed by sensual gratifications."
 - "All living up to a supposed social position,
- o Pupit
 - not merely the lust after the flesh, but all lust that has its seat in the flesh.
 - The lust of the eyes is that lust that has its origin in sight (Augenlust)—curiosity, covetousness, etc.
 - arrogancy of living, is ostentation exhibited in the manner of living; the empty pride and pretentiousness of fashion and display. It includes the desire to gain credit which does not belong to us, and outshine our neighbours.
- o M.Henry
 - There is the lust of the flesh. The flesh here, being distinguished from the eyes and the life, imports the body. The lust of the flesh is, subjectively, the humour and appetite of indulging fleshly pleasures; and, objectively, all those things that excite and inflame the pleasures of the flesh. This lust is usually called *luxury*.
 - There is *the lust of the eyes*. The eyes are delighted with treasures; riches and rich possessions are craved by an extravagant eye; this is the lust of covetousness.
 - There is the *pride of life*. A vain mind craves all the grandeur, equipage, and pomp of a vain-glorious life; this is ambition, and thirst after honour and applause. This is, in part, the disease of the ear; it must be flattered with admiration and praise.
- **J-F-B**
 - lust of the eyes the avenue through which outward things of the world, riches, pomp, and beauty, inflame us. Satan tried this temptation on Christ when he showed Him the kingdoms of the world in a moment. By the lust of the eyes David (<u>2Sa 11:2</u>) and Achan fell (<u>Jos 7:21</u>). Compare David's prayer, <u>Psa 119:37</u>; Job's resolve, <u>Psa 31:1</u>; <u>Mat 5:28</u>.
- 1 Cor 10.13

- o RWP
 - The way of escape (ten ekbasin). "The way out" is always there right along with (sun) the temptation.
 - It is cowardly to yield to temptation and distrustful of God.
- o Vincent
 - Common to man (ἀνθρώπινος) The word means what belongs to men, human.
 - They are in danger and must watch, but the temptation will not be beyond their strength.
 - A way to escape (τὴν ἕκβασιν) Rev., better, the way of escape. The word means an egress, <u>a way out</u>.
- o Pulpit
 - St. Paul, therefore, reminds them that these temptations were not superhuman, but were such as men had resisted, and such as they could resist.
 - mode of deliverance shall be ready simultaneously with the temptation. Away to escape; rather, the way to escape.
- o M.Henry
 - for either our trials will be proportioned to our strength, or strength will be supplied in proportion to our temptations.
 - He knows what we can bear, and what we can bear up against; and he will, in his wise providence, either proportion our temptations to our strength or make us able to grapple with them.
- o **J-F-B**
 - To bear it Greek, "to bear up under it," or "against it." Not, He will take it away
